## GAMMA CHAPTER ANNOUNCES \$2.5 MILLION CAMPAIGN TO UPDATE CHAPTER HOUSE

## More Than \$1.2 Million Already Committed by Generous Alumni

It is an honor to address you as we begin a rebuilding campaign for the  $A\Gamma\Sigma$  Gamma Chapter at UNL. I have fond memories of the beginnings of this chapter starting with a small group of young men originating from the Ag Men's Club.

Our goal was to build a fraternal organization that would focus primarily on academics. Five of our first graduating class were ranked in the top 10 of the college for GPA. The Gamma Chapter was installed in the fall of 1953, my senior year. Our first residence was in a large family home at 3240 Holdrege Street until the opportunity arose to buy a recently vacated fraternity house at 4001 Holdrege Street, the site of the current house.

Most of the founding members came from family farm operations and some returned from the Korean War eager to receive a college education. This speaks well of the membership of  $A\Gamma\Sigma$ ; committed young men using their intellect and will to achieve the best possible station in life as agricultural producers, engineers, chemists, and financiers in this great state and country of tremendous opportunity.

Many friendships and relationships were forged over the years through this fraternal brotherhood; we share a common bond from membership through  $A\Gamma\Sigma.$  It is inspiring to witness the involvement and dedication of the current membership as they become the next generation of leaders. It is my hope that this fraternity will continue to make far-reaching, positive contributions to this country by valuing its members, this university, this state and all its resources.

Today, we have an incredible opportunity to build on our recent success and our storied history. I am pleased to announce *Building the Future of Gamma Chapter: The Campaign for Alpha Gamma Sigma*. This capital campaign will allow us to build a new house, or completely renovate our chapter house, making it fit the needs of the student of today and tomorrow while preserving our culture and values in which we stand for. We are behind the curve on this as FarmHouse, Alpha Gamma Rho, and 10 other fraternities at UNL have already begun or completed renovations and very successful capital campaigns. I encourage each of you to think back to your  $A\Gamma\Sigma$  experience and pay it forward to help this cam-

paign be successful. The foundation we established in 1953 will benefit the future of AF $\Sigma$  and help us compete as a top-tier fraternity at UNL.

I'm confident we can expect great things of our fundraising campaign, but we will only achieve our vision if we work together to make this project a reality. Our fundraising goal is \$2.5 million and we currently have secured more than \$1.2 million in pledges from 66 generous alumni. Having fostered friendships with current members of Alpha Gamma Sigma, and knowing that other friends of his were interested in joining, the decision to become a member of Gamma Chapter seemed to be an easy one. "My life at  $A\Gamma\Sigma$  was great because I was surrounded by people with similar interests, primarily agriculture. I knew I wanted to continue my post-graduate career in agriculture, so living and working alongside like-minded men everyday only helped solidify that goal."

 $A\Gamma\Sigma$  not only strengthened Shane's relationships, but created new ones. Something that he enjoyed about  $A\Gamma\Sigma$  was that every semester, it was required that everybody change roommates, which allowed them to get to know brothers he might not have otherwise. "The mandatory roommate switch forced us out of our comfort zones and allowed us to appreciate our differences, celebrate our similarities, and work through problems. I didn't have

brothers growing up, and one of my greatest appreciations of the fraternity is that I immediately had 70-plus brothers."

After graduating, Shane served on Gamma Chapter's alumni board as the risk management advisor. "Our house served us well for many years, but it was clear we were in need of a better home for our members moving forward. Now that we're in the midst of a campaign to update the house, it's important for alumni to look at their time at  $A\Gamma\Sigma$  and focus on what they got out of their experience. I give credit for many of



my life's successes to  $A\Gamma\Sigma$  and the lessons I learned there. My commitment is my way of paying back and paying it forward. I hope this campaign not only creates a better home for future  $A\Gamma\Sigma$  members at UNL, but develops a solid foundation for leaders on campus and in the agricultural world moving forward.

"I was very fortunate that the people in the house when I was an undergraduate were great leaders. Since graduation, I've seen the leadership ebb and flow, as it does in all organizations, but as of late I'm pleased to see the group we have maintaining that commitment to the fraternity and to campus. I can only hope we solidify that moving forward. Alumni can do their part to lead by example, and the best way to do that now is to focus on the campaign. We have a five-year time frame to pay our pledges, so push yourself and think how important the fraternity was in your formation as a young adult as you make a commitment. Remember, those who build our house in the '70s used a whole lot of fortitude to make it happen.


#### **ΑΓΣ GIVES BACK**
